

Ethical Standards



Dignity and **Respect** are core ethical values of all helping professions:

- Social workers respect the inherent **dignity** and worth of the person.
- The nurse practices with compassion and respect for the inherent **dignity**, worth, and unique attributes of every person.
- CCMs will respect the rights and inherent **dignity** of all of their clients.
- Social workers should treat colleagues with **respect** and should represent accurately and fairly the qualifications, views, and obligations of colleagues.
- Collaboration (within nursing) intrinsically requires mutual trust, recognition, **respect**, transparency, shared decision-making, and open communication among all who share concern and responsibility for health outcomes.
- CCMs will **respect** the rights and inherent dignity of all of their clients. They will act with integrity and fidelity with clients and others.
